Goals of the Marist Basketball Carnival

To provide a sporting Carnival where our students can:

- enjoy the company of other young Australians giving expression to their social, religious and sporting aspirations
- develop their skills of fairness and integrity in basketball through friendly competition with teams from Marist schools, and
- share with other young people around Australia our Marist traditions, values, vision and story.

Beginnings

Marcellin Champagnat was born in 1789 in the small French hamlet of Le Rosey in the hilly country to the south west of Lyon. Marcellin was part of a group of young men that wanted to start a new order in the church modelled on the ways of Mary and, on the day following their ordination, they gathered at the Fourviere Cathedral in Lyon to make a pledge to this cause. Coming himself from a rural area, Marcellin aspired to found the 'Little Brothers of Mary' (later known as the 'Marist Brothers'), who would build schools to develop and educate 'good Christians and good citizens'. Others in the ordination group, such as Jean-Claude Colin, sought to found the Marist Fathers to serve parishes, and the Marist Sisters bring the spirit of Mary to new places and people.

Marist Schools in Australia

The first Marist Brother in Australia was Brother Michael Colombon, who was trained by Marcellin Champagnat in France. He arrived in Sydney on December 9, 1837. From humble beginnings, the Marist Brothers received invitations to form new schools throughout Australia. Today, there are close to fifty schools throughout Australia that have been governed or influenced by the Marist Brothers and many others that have been governed or influenced by Marist Fathers and Marist Sisters. Today, the Marist Association of St Marcellin Champagnat oversees Marist Schools Australia, who are the hosts of these sporting Carnivals, bringing us together to commemorate and celebrate our common heritage.

History of the Carnival

The concept of the national sporting carnivals to bring students from Marist schools together, began with cricket in the mid-1970s. Basketball carnivals for boys were a feature of the 1980s and, as schools developed their co-educational programs, netball and girls' basketball were soon added to the program. It's now difficult to imagine Marist life without these celebrations! The Carnivals respect the fine traditions of Marist life with an opening Mass, social networking, a celebratory final dinner and, of course, hard fought but respectful competition.

Players Pledge

I promise that I shall take part in the coming Marist Basketball Carnival, respecting and abiding by the rules which govern them in the true spirit of sport and competition.

Coaches, volunteers and managers pledge

I will encourage good sporting spirit at the Marist Basketball Carnival, by demonstrating positive support for all players, coaches, officials and volunteers at every event. May my words bring encouragement, my actions vitality, and my intentions honour.

A Child Safe Carnival

Each of the schools participating in the Carnival is committed to the safety of each and every child who attends. Child Safety is at the heart of this Carnival and every student who attends, whether competing, assisting or spectating, has the right to feel safe at all times. Whilst schools each have their own policies and procedures at the Carnival, every adult is expected to adhere to this simple Code of Conduct:

DO:

- Behave as a positive role model to students.
- Promote the safety, welfare and wellbeing of students.
- Be vigilant and proactive with regard to student safety and child protection issues.
- Provide age appropriate supervision for students.
- Comply with guidelines published by the Carnival Committee with respect to child protection.
- Treat all students with respect.
- Promote the safety, participation and empowerment of students with a disability.
- Promote the cultural safety, participation and empowerment of linguistically and culturally diverse students.
- Use positive and affirming language toward students.
- Encourage students to 'have a say' and then listen to them with respect.
- Respect cultural, religious and political differences.
- Help provide an open, safe and supportive environment for all students to interact, and socialise.
- Intervene when students are engaging in inappropriate bullying behaviour towards others or acting in a humiliating or vilifying way.
- Report any breaches of this Child Protection Code of Conduct to the Carnival Child Safe Officers (see below).
- Report concerns about child safety to one of the Carnival's Child Safety Officers (see below) and ensure that your legal obligations to report allegations externally are met.
- Where an allegation of child abuse is made, ensure as quickly as possible that the student involved is safe.
- Call the Police on 000 if you have immediate concerns for a student's safety.
- Respect the privacy of students and their families and only disclose information to people who have a need to know.

DON'T:

- Engage in any form of inappropriate behaviour towards students or expose students to such behaviour.
- Use prejudice, oppressive behaviour or inappropriate language with students.
- Express personal views on cultures, race or sexuality in the presence of students or discriminate against any student based on culture, race, ethnicity or disability.
- Engage in open discussions of an adult nature in the presence of students.
- Engage in any form of sexual conduct with a student including making sexually suggestive comments and sharing sexually suggestive material.
- Engage in inappropriate or unnecessary physical conduct or behaviours including doing things of a personal nature that a student can do for themselves, such as toileting or changing clothes.
- Engage in any form of physical violence towards a student including inappropriately rough physical play.
- Use physical means or corporal punishment to discipline or control a student.
- Engage in any form of behaviour that has the potential to cause a student serious emotional or psychological harm.
- Develop 'special' relationships with students that could be seen as favouritism (for example, the offering of gifts or special treatment for specific students).
- Engage in undisclosed private meetings with a student that is not your own child.
- Engage in inappropriate personal communications with a student through any medium, including any online contact or interactions with a student.
- Take or publish (including online) photos, movies or recordings of a student without parental/carer consent.

- Post online any information about a student that may identify them such as their: full name; age; e-mail address; telephone number; residence; school; or details of a club or group they may attend.
- Ignore or disregard any suspected or disclosed child abuse.

What to do if you have a concern

If you believe a participant or visitor to the Carnival has acted in an unsafe way towards a student (verbally, physically or through their behaviours), we encourage you to speak with the senior most staff member from the school involved. If, for some reason, this is not appropriate or possible, the Child Safe phone will be available to report matters of concern. Both students and staff are encouraged to use this number if they would like to report a suspicious or unsafe matter.

Match Ball

- Size 6 for the Girls competition
- Size 7 for the Boys competition

Number of Players

• The maximum number of players will be 10

Score Bench

• Team managers from each school will score bench each game

Technical fouls for abuse by players (SIN BIN)

- Technical fouls for verbal abuse of an official shall result in the player being substituted to the team bench for five (5) minutes of playing time. Player can be replaced.
- When the official calls a technical foul, they are to look at the clock and quote the time remaining, so the score bench officials can note it on the scoresheet, e.g. 8:411 st quarter and the player can then re-enter
- the game at 3:41 or after via a substitution through the score table.

Timings for all games except for the Championship Grand Finals

- WARM UP: all games will start at the specified time.
- GAME TIME: 4 x I O minute quarters with the clock stopping for all timeouts. Last 2min of the 4th quarter is fully timed if the score is within I O points or less.
- 1/4 & 3/4 TIME INTERVALS: I minute break.
- 1/2 TIME INTERVAL: 2 minutes.
- TIMEOUTS: I time out per team per quarter which cannot be carried over.
- OVERTIME: Championship redrawn pool games and semi-finals (3-minute period).
- I minute break before overtime begins.
- 1 timeout permitted per team.

Timings for the Championship Grand Final (Boy's and Girl's)

- WARM UP: minimum 5 minutes.
- Bench staff supplied by host school.
- GAME TIME: 4 x 8 minute quarters fully timed with a 24-second shot clock.
- 1/4 & 3/4TIME INTERVALS: I minute.
- 1/2 TIME INTERVAL: 2 minutes.
- TIMEOUTS: I time out per team per quarter which cannot be carried over.
- OVERTIME: 3-minutes fully timed, 2-minute interval, I time out per team per OT.

Pool Matches / Placing for Finals

- The classification of teams in all Pools shall be made on points according to their win loss record, namely 3 points for a win, 2 points for a draw and 1 point for a loss. There are no points for a forfeit.

- If two teams are equal on points, the result of the game between the two teams will be used to determine placings.

- If more than two teams are equal on points, the result of the games between the teams tied will be used to determine the placings.

- If the teams in the points mentioned directly above are still equal, placings will be determined on goal average (points for divided by points against) using the results of the games between the tied teams.

- If the teams in the points mentioned above are still equal, placings will be determined on goal average using the results of all games in the Pool group.

Further Competition Information

- Players disqualified by a referee from a game, shall not play in the following game for that team. Individual schools may lengthen this suspension.
- Each school is expected to provide one bench official. Any school that has two teams across both venues during the carnival and require assistance with score bench, please let the Carnival Convener know and MCC will endeavor to provide some support.
- All players are to be attired in the registered uniform of his/her school.
- Each player's surname and initial should be written on the score-sheet 30 minutes before the start of each game. The coach's name should also appear in the space provided. Computerised score-sheets will be used wherever possible. The referee should tally and sign the scoresheet at the end of the game.
- Any team not ready to commence play when called upon, shall forfeit one point for every minute late, until 10 minutes has elapsed, at which point the game shall be declared a forfeit.
- In the event of a player being fouled out of the game the coach has 30 seconds to replace the player before the game recommences (clock is stopped).
- If a player is injured during the game and the referee calls "time out", the player must be replaced by the coach as soon as possible.
- The Disputes Committee, which consists of a Chair plus two others, will hear disputes: The Chair is to be someone who is not involved with any of the teams. Membership is drawn from the following:
- Representative of the Host School
- Referees Coordinator for the Championship
- Representative of the MSA Organising Committee
- A representative of each school in the dispute is to be available if required but they are not members of the Dispute Committee.
- The Disputes Committee decision is final.

Assumption College, Kilmore, VIC



Founded in 1893 Assumption College was one of the first Marist Schools to be established in Victoria, along with Marist Brothers College Bendigo also established in 1893. Situated 60kms north of Melbourne, Kilmore was one of the early staging posts for Cobb & Co Coaches and is one of the oldest townships in country Victoria.

Assumption was originally founded to educate local primary school age boys, but soon became a combined Primary & Secondary Boarding School to meet the needs of young boys from the more remote parts of Victoria and Southern New South Wales. Girls first attended in 1971 and full co-education in the day school was achieved in 1986. Co-educational Boarding was established in 1995.

Today there are 1470 students at Assumption, with 68 boarding.

Assumption College has always had a rich sporting history, particularly in the traditional Australian sports of Cricket and Football. Both our Boys and Girls are really looking forward to participating in the Marist Basketball Carnival once again.

Good Counsel College, Innisfail, QLD



Good Counsel College is a Year 7–12 co-educational Catholic school located in Innisfail in the Cairns Diocese in Far North Queensland. Innisfail is located 95 kilometres south of Cairns and has a population of 7500.

The Marist Brothers first arrived in Innisfail in 1938 with the opening of the Marist Brothers School which catered to boys from Year 4 to 8 with boys in lower grades continuing to be taught by the Sisters of the Good Samaritan at the Sacred Heart School. Lavalla Catholic College is a tri-campus independent Roman Catholic co-educational secondary school located in the township of Traralgon in Gippsland, Victoria. The college began in 1951 when the Presentation Sisters established their convent in Moe and began to teach students.

In 1956, St. Paul's College was founded on Grey Street by the Marist Fathers as an all-boys school. The Marist Brothers assumed responsibility for the administration of St. Paul's in 1962. Also in that year, the Brigidine Sisters established the all-girls school, Kildare College, on the Kosciuszko Street site.

In 1979, a mini system of three schools was created: Kildare and St Paul's for Year 7–10 and a new senior campus, Lourdes College for Years 11 and 12. In 1979, after the Brigidine Sisters withdrew, the three colleges became

one co-educational school called Catholic Regional College. In 2002, Catholic Regional College amalgamated with Presentation College Newborough creating Lavalla Catholic College.

This is the 29th year the College has teams represented at the Marist Basketball Carnival. Our boys' teams best place finish has been 3rd on three occasions while our girls' teams have performed strongly over the years to claim 14 Marist Championship titles. Desiree Glaubitz and Jade Melbourne are the two biggest basketball names to come out of the College. Desiree captained the AIS to the WNBL Championships during the 1998–1999 season before having stints at Sydney, Townsville and Bulleen before retiring. Desiree was a member of the silver medal winning Australian Junior team at the 1997 Junior World Championships and she also had stints internationally in Spain and Italy. Jade has been a member of Bulleen and Canberra in the WNBL, represented Australia at Junior World Championships and just recently signed with Seattle Storm in the WNBA. Jade represented Lavalla at Marist in 2016–2017.

Marist College Canberra, ACT



The origins of Marist College Canberra are found in the first school established by the Marist Brothers in Australia, St Patrick's in Harrington Street, near The Rocks, Sydney. An increase in numbers necessitated a move to larger premises and in 1887 the High School was transferred to buildings in the grounds of St. Mary's Cathedral. In 1910 the school moved again to new and larger buildings in Liverpool Street, Darlinghurst.

Despite the flourishing of "The High School" as it became known, demographic and educational changes forced the difficult decision to close in 1968 and to transfer its badge, colours and motto to Canberra.

Since that time the College has grown rapidly and in its own relatively short history has distinguished itself through its high academic, sporting and cultural record. In the 2015 season the Marist Senior Basketball team won the ASC competition and the Basketball ACT U/19 Division 1 title. The most recognizable and successful basketball student to come out of the College is Patrick Mills who attended Marist from year 4–10 (2004). Since leaving the College Patrick has played College basketball for St. Mary's (USA), Australian Boomers and has won a NBA Championship with the San Antonio Spurs. In 2020 Alex Toohey accepted a position in the Centre of Excellence Basketball program, where he has since competed with the Australian Boomers in their FIBA qualifications and is prospected to attend a Division 1 College in the USA in 2023.



Trinity College, Beenleigh, QLD

Trinity Catholic College Lismore is a co-educational College for students in Years 7 to 12 with an enrolment of approximately 900 students. The College is located in Lismore, occupying two sites following the 2022 flood events: Year 7–10 students are educated at our campus on the site of Southern Cross University (R Block) and our Year 11–12 students are educated at our Trinity campus on the grounds of St John's College Woodlawn.
